

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One Hundred Years of Quality



M. Claude Bresson (1802-1869) Founder of the firm of Cartier-Bresson.

ONE hundred years ago, in 1824, a Early Days, M. Claude Bresson bought a small sewing-cotton factory in Paris. Upon this small foundation has been built up the huge business known throughout the world as Cartier-Bresson, which in 1897 was formed into the Société Française de Cotons à Coudre, Établissements Cartier-Bresson.

First Steps. A definite policy was decided upon even in the early days-the improvement of every stage of manufacture until perfection of finished article had been attained. The first results of this policy were obtained three years later, in 1827, when increased business necessitated larger premises. Still later, in 1859, another factory was taken at Pantin, near Paris. This factory, now considerably altered and enlarged, is one of the largest in the suburbs of Paris.




Factory at Paris of Cartier-Bresson Frères, successors to M. Claude Bresson.

IN 1862 the sales department and World-wide offices were removed to the present demand site, 86 Boulevard de Sebastopol, calls for Paris. By this time a world-wide further demand for C·B articles had been extensions. created. The Pantin Factory could not cope with the demand, so further factories were built in the East of France at the following places :-

- 1872 Usine de Luvigny.
- 1874 Celles-sur-Plaine.
- 1875 Pierre Percée.
- Azerailles. 1898

THERE are reasons for the continued development of C·B. In the attainment of "C·B quality" nothing is left to chance. The C.B Laboratories are continually engaged in experimenting. When new articles such as the mingled shades in C·B Brilliant Stranded Cotton are placed on the market, they are subjected to exhaustive tests. Every quality claimed for C·B articles has been proved by tests in the C.B Laboratories.

Since the 1900 Exhibition no further Exhibitions have been held.

C.B threads are made of the finest Raw Egyptian cotton. Bought and spun material in Lancashire, the cotton enters the Works in bales, and after being doubled and twisted it is bleached, dyed, glazed and mercerised.

Bleaching.

THE C·B special process gives to the cotton a dazzling whiteness, an elasticity without snapping, and a remarkable lustre, which keeps all its brilliance, even after the thread has been used and washed. This constitutes a speciality of the firm and is most necessary when used on articles designed for hard domestic wear. At the same time the artistic finish required for fine embroideries, lace-making work, crochet, etc., is fully brought out.

Dyeing.

ONLY the best dyes are used. Each dye is most carefully tested in the laboratories and no shade is allowed to pass out until it can fulfil every claim made for it. C B dyes are fast to wash, to light and to ordinary wear. This is a plain statement of fact which, first tested in the laboratories, is proved by the universal appreciation of C.B dyes.


Mercerisation.

THE C·B process of mercerisation is a special method that results in a particularly brilliant lustre (hence the description "Brilliant" to C.B mercerised threads). A properly mercerised cotton yarn can be made to resemble real silk, and the wearing

properties are very much greater. "CB" is a properly mercerised cotton yarn and its close resemblance to real silk in its soft lustrous texture is recognised as a triumph of mercerisation. The heat of the hand does not affect the mercerisation of C.B threads.

It is interesting to note that C.B "Putting make their own cardboard boxes up" and and have their own printing estab- Boxing. lishment. Thus the same uniform quality is obtained in the "putting up," banding and boxing of the various articles.

THE very latest methods of "putting up" the various C.B articles are employed. The finished C·B article is as distinctive in its "putting up" as it is exclusive in quality. C.B articles are well protected against dust in well made neat boxes of C·B's own manufacture.

A specialty of C·B is the "Stock Boxes," consisting of nests of drawers for various articles. These stock boxes keep the articles clean, away from dust, and are very attractive as counter "furniture," designed as they are to promote " quick service."

THE C·B range includes every article for embroidery, darning, knitting and crochet, lace threads and tapes. There is a very large range of shades, all fast dyes to wash and wear.

THE C·B mercerisation produces a soft silky texture and brilliant lustre. As a knitted or crochet material C·B Cotton is very warm to wear.

Doctors recommend pure cotton for next-the-skin wear because good quality mercerised cotton has the peculiar properties of retaining the

heat of the body whilst repelling the cold of the atmosphere. In hot weather cotton wear is cool because it keeps out the hot heat of day, allowing the body to retain an equable temperature.

Embroidery. AFTER your customer has chosen the piece of traced work, you are often

who sold her the articles. The few points made below may prove useful when selling Embroidery work.

C·B Floche (Articles Nos. 214, 215) or C·B Coton à Broder (Articles Nos. 208, 211, 227, 207) should be recommended. The former for solid results (because of the loose-

asked, "What thread shall I use?" It is then you should recommend the best threads to produce the best results desired. If the wrong threads have been recommended the customer will feel not only dissatisfied with the work, but will be inclined to blame the person

ness in twist, ensuring the necessary binding). C·B Coton à Broder should be recommended for Richelieu and Broderie Anglaise.

(In the C·B wholesale price lists will be found a useful key to corresponding sizes of C·B Embroidery

Cottons.) Always recommend a needle with a larger eye than the size of the thread, it prevents a bruised appearance to the work and that aggravating snapping of the thread. When padding is required, advise C B Special Padding Cotton (Articles 64-66).

Flat Embroidery.

THE C.B small skein of Stranded Cotton (Article 201) produces an effect quite equal to real silk, whilst much harder and longer wear is obtained.

Children's Garments. MOTHER'S first thought is "will it wear well, wash well, last a long time and look well all the time," and cost as little as possible, of course.

You can recommend C.B Brilliant Stranded (Articles Nos. 200, 202) or Perle Cotton (Articles Nos. 203, 219) for every description of Children's Knitted or Crochet Wear. Dresses, Babies' Booties, Dutch Bonnets, Socks, Stockings, Under-C·B threads prove their wear. economy by the fact that many of the garments mentioned can be made from one hank or two balls of Stranded or Perle Cotton, and

will wash again and again, neither shrinking nor breaking into holes.

Most smart and effective jumpers Ladies' and dresses are made of C.B Brilliant Knitted Stranded (Articles Nos. 200, 202) or Brilliant Perlé Cotton (Articles Nos. 219, 203). The lustrous sheen of the threads gives a soft silky effect with the additional advantage of durable wear, most essential for sports jumpers, golfing suits and all outo'-door clothes. C.B threads are highly recommended by expert needlewomen for knitting and crochet.

and Crochet Wear.

THE latest creation of C.B is the C·B Marl Effect Cotton (Article 200) which produces beautiful contrasting shades (all fast dyes) and is most attractive knitted up into jumpers or dresses. It is also very effective for knitting hose, ties, hat-bands, etc.

OWING to the fact that C.B Cotton Ladies' is a natural product, not artificially Underwear. made, it can be confidently recommended for all ladies underwear as well as jumpers, costumes, hats, gloves, stockings, etc. C.B Brilliant Stranded Cotton (Articles

Nos. 200, 202) is the best article to recommend for light summer underwear, it will long outlast machine woven articles. In advising C·B threads you should remember that the silky texture, lustre and colours are unaffected by heat of the body, washing, or continued hard wear.

Crochet.

C.B Crochet Cotton (Article 221) is the very finest cotton obtainable, it does not discolour in the wash, and is of perfectly even texture throughout. You can sell and recommend C.B Crochet Cotton with every confidence that it will produce the desired best results.

Darning.

A LONG-FELT demand for a darning cotton suitable for mending silks and artificial silk hose is met in C·B Mending Cotton (Article 265). This is a highly mercerised thread with a beautifully silky texture in every hose shade—all the most fashionable shades, as well as the usual ordinary stock colours. The "putting up" is in cards divided into three sections (Article 265). The yarn on the cards is so wound that from one thread up to as many as are required can be used easily.

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Lace-making is becoming very Lacefashionable. C.B specialise for this making section with their Articles Nos. 302, 305 and 551, 505. If you are asked for a thread to make the lace on blinds, recommend Article 302 or 305 where cotton is required, and Article 551 or 505 for linen. The coarse Nos. in crochet cotton (Article 221) are also sometimes used, particularly in écru.

C.B THREADS wear and last for many Washing. years, and if carefully washed will be as good as new long after similar threads are worn out or have lost their colour.

To ensure perfect washing, use hot water (not boiling), and make into a soapy lather by using soaps such as Sunlight or Lux. Carefully avoid using any soaps which contain bleaching or acid ingredients.

Do not scrub, Do not mangle.

Do not hang up to dry any knitted or crocheted garment, as it causes it to drag, but lay perfectly flat. When quite dry place a slightly damp cloth over and iron with a moderately hot iron. This makes the mercerisation as good as new.


